CELEBRATING 125 YEARS OF MINISTRY

FERN TRINITY EC CHURCH, KOSSUTH, PA

The congregation of Fern Trinity EC Church of Kossuth, Pennsylvania celebrated their 125th anniversary the weekend of September 25 and 26. The milestone actually passed a year ago, but could not be observed because of the pandemic.

As early as 1830, class meetings and worship services were held in the area, with gatherings in groves during warm months and in homes during the winter. In 1834, the congregation moved into the Wise School on Camp Coffman Road. They continued to worship there for about 39 years.

In 1872, oil was struck in the village of Fern. The following year, an Evangelical Association church was established and a building erected in nearby Ashland. The future Fern Trinity congregation was part of that church for a number of years.

In 1885, the Philadelphia Inquirer reported that, in July, Fern consisted of a schoolhouse, a hardware store and a tent. The report continued that by August, Fern was “a thriving community, with a weekly newspaper and other evidences of civilization.”

However, the “boomtown” brought social ills. The Oil City Derrick described the “fighting, lawlessness, and general debauchery” of Fern City. Possibly, in response to these problems, the first preaching there took place on October 4, 1885. The Fern City Weekly Illuminator reported that Rev. J.H. Keely came from Edenburg (now Knox) to deliver his sermon.

FERN TRINITY EC CHURCH, KOSSUTH, PA

In 1891, a denominational dispute split the Evangelical Association. The group that was to become Trinity left Ashland, joining the newly formed United Evangelicals and meeting in the Fern Macabee Hall.

To meet the need of a new location, Mr. and Mrs. William L. Hess donated an acre of land. The builders, Oliver Sanders and Son, began construction. A new church was completed at a cost of \$1,500.00. It was debt free when it was dedicated in 1895 by Rev. J.J. Carmany. Rev. W.W. Elrick was pastor from 1895 to 1898.



The building committee consisted of Conrad Kenemuth, John Kenemuth, and Christian Stumpner. Trustees were Alexander Shreffler, John Cotherman, Conrad Kenemuth, John Stumpner, and R.R. Carpenter.

In 1922, an effort was made to reunite the Evangelical Association and the United Evangelicals. Trinity did not join the merger and became part of the new Evangelical Congregational denomination.

Over the years, many changes to the church and surrounding property have taken place. One of the most significant was a two-story addition, begun in 1971. This included an expanded Christian education space and a lower level with a kitchen and fellowship area. Indoor plumbing became a necessity, and water came from a newly-drilled well. All of this took place in the middle of a twenty-year period of Fern's being on a charge with nearby Grace EC Church.

Attendance increased, and in 1981, the church began functioning on its own. In 1984, they purchased a parsonage. However, from 1992 to 1995, Trinity was again part of a two-church charge, this time with Seneca EC Church. Momentum was restored, and Trinity returned to solo status. At that time, a new parsonage was built.

Historian, Charlie Cotherman writes, "The year 2000 saw the congregation at Fern on the threshold of new opportunities. In the next years, her outreach would spread into hunting camps, high schools, and all corners of the community, as members held forth the love and hope of Jesus Christ."

The anniversary event included a Saturday evening hymn sing; a Sunday morning service, with message by Bishop Bruce Hill; and a Sunday noon dinner. The "grand finale" was an afternoon celebration, with an additional message by Bishop Hill. Other participants were former pastors, Rev. John Friedlund and Rev. Mark Micklos; Allegheny District Field Director, Rev. Lewie Bennett; and former District Field Director, Rev. Gary Brown. The program also included choir music, and slide show, and sharing from the congregation.

Current pastor is Rev. Shawn Morgan, who has served Trinity since 2016. Along with Shawn, wife Jennifer, and sons, Austin and Noah, have contributed much in worship music. Zane is an additional son.

Bruce commented, "The state of the Evangelical Congregational Church is good. We continue to make progress and reach out into our communities." He also pointed out the need to, "Be still and know that I am God."

Election of the next Bishop followed the message. Votes were cast in favor of Rev. Randy Sizemore. Randy is currently pastor at Bethel EC Church in Dixon, Illinois. He served three churches in Pennsylvania and was Global Ministries Director. Wife is Carla.

Randy will take office at National Conference on May 25, 2022.
